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USER MANUAL

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1 Safety

Observe the following safety instructions.

1.1 General information

- Read this instruction manual carefully.
- Keep the instruction manual and the product information safe for future reference or for the next owner.
- Do not connect the appliance if it has been damaged in transit.

1.2 Intended use

This appliance is designed only to be built into kitchen units. Read the special installation instructions.

Only a licensed professional may connect appliances without plugs. Damage caused by incorrect connection is not covered under the warranty.

Only use this appliance:

- To prepare meals and drinks.
- In private households and in enclosed spaces in a domestic environment.
- Up to an altitude of max. 4000 m above sea level.

1.3 Restriction on user group

This appliance may be used by children aged 8 or over and by people who have reduced physical, sensory or mental abilities or inadequate experience and/or knowledge, provided that they are supervised or have been instructed on how to use the appliance safely and have understood the resulting dangers.

Children must not play with the appliance. Children must not perform cleaning or user maintenance unless they are at least 15 years old and are being supervised.

Keep children under the age of 8 years away from the appliance and power cable.

1.4 Safe use

Always place accessories in the cooking compartment the right way round.

→ "Accessories", Page 9

▲ WARNING – Risk of fire!

Combustible objects that are left in the cooking compartment may catch fire.

- Never store combustible objects in the cooking compartment.
- If smoke is emitted, the appliance must be switched off or the plug must be pulled out and the door must be held closed in order to stifle any flames.

Loose food remnants, fat and meat juices may catch fire.

Before using the appliance, remove the worst of the food residues and remnants from the cooking compartment, heating elements and accessories.

Opening the appliance door creates a draught. Greaseproof paper may come into contact with the heating element and catch fire.

- Never place greaseproof paper loosely over accessories when preheating the appliance and while cooking.
- Always cut greaseproof paper to size and use a plate or baking tin to hold it down.

MARNING – Risk of burns!

The appliance and its parts that can be touched become hot during use.

- Caution should be exercised here in order to avoid touching heating elements.
- Young children under 8 years of age must be kept away from the appliance.

Accessories and cookware get very hot.

 Always use oven gloves to remove accessories or cookware from the cooking compartment.

When the cooking compartment is hot, any alcoholic vapours inside may catch fire.

- Only use small quantities of drinks with a high alcohol content in food.
- Open the appliance door carefully.

▲ WARNING – Risk of scalding!

The accessible parts of the appliance become hot during operation.

- Never touch these hot parts.
- ► Keep children at a safe distance.

Hot steam may escape when you open the appliance door. Steam may not be visible, depending on the temperature.

- Open the appliance door carefully.
- ► Keep children at a safe distance.

If there is water in the cooking compartment when it is hot, this may create hot steam.

 Never pour water into the cooking compartment when the cooking compartment is hot.

▲ WARNING – Risk of injury!

Scratched glass in the appliance door may develop into a crack.

Do not use any harsh or abrasive cleaners or sharp metal scrapers to clean the glass on the oven door, as they may scratch the surface.

The hinges on the appliance door move when the door is opened and closed, which could trap your fingers.

 Keep your hands away from the hinges.
 Components inside the appliance door may have sharp edges.

Wear protective gloves.

▲ WARNING – Risk of electric shock!

Incorrect repairs are dangerous.

- Repairs to the appliance should only be carried out by trained specialist staff.
- Only use genuine spare parts when repairing the appliance.
- If the power cord of this appliance is damaged, it must be replaced by trained specialist staff.

If the insulation of the power cord is damaged, this is dangerous.

- Never let the power cord come into contact with hot appliance parts or heat sources.
- Never let the power cord come into contact with sharp points or edges.
- Never kink, crush or modify the power cord.

An ingress of moisture can cause an electric shock.

 Do not use steam- or high-pressure cleaners to clean the appliance. If the appliance or the power cord is damaged, this is dangerous.

- ► Never operate a damaged appliance.
- Never operate an appliance with a cracked or fractured surface.
- Never pull on the power cord to unplug the appliance. Always unplug the appliance at the mains.
- If the appliance or the power cord is damaged, immediately unplug the power cord or switch off the fuse in the fuse box.

MARNING – Danger: Magnetism!

Permanent magnets are used in the control panel or in the controls. These may affect electronic implants, e.g. heart pacemakers or insulin pumps.

 Wearers of electronic implants must stay at least 10 cm away from the control panel.

MARNING – Risk of suffocation!

Children may put packaging material over their heads or wrap themselves up in it and suffocate.

- Keep packaging material away from children.
- Do not let children play with packaging material.

Children may breathe in or swallow small parts, causing them to suffocate.

- ► Keep small parts away from children.
- ► Do not let children play with small parts.

1.5 Halogen bulb

▲ WARNING – Risk of burns!

The bulbs in the cooking compartment get very hot. There is still a risk of burning for some time after they have been switched off.

- Do not touch the glass cover.
- Avoid contact with your skin when cleaning.

▲ WARNING – Risk of electric shock!

When changing the bulb, the bulb socket contacts are live.

- Before replacing the bulb, ensure that the appliance is switched off in order to prevent a potential electric shock.
- Also unplug the appliance from the mains or switch off the circuit breaker in the fuse box.

1.6 Meat probe

MARNING – Risk of electric shock!

Using the wrong meat probe could damage the insulation.

 Only use the meat probe for this specific appliance.

1.7 Cleaning function

▲ WARNING – Risk of fire!

Loose food remnants, fat and meat juices may catch fire when the cleaning function is in progress.

 Before you start the cleaning function, always remove coarse dirt from the cooking compartment.

► Never clean accessories at the same time. The outside of the appliance gets very hot when the cleaning function is in progress.

- Never hang combustible objects, e.g. tea towels, on the door handle.
- ► Leave the front of the appliance clear.
- Keep children at a safe distance.

If the door seal is damaged, a large amount of heat is generated around the door.

- Do not scrub or remove the seal.
- Never operate the appliance if the seal is damaged or missing.

▲ WARNING – Risk of serious harm to health!

The appliance gets very hot when the cleaning function is in progress. The non-stick coating on baking trays and tins is destroyed and noxious gases are released.

- Never clean non-stick baking trays or baking tins using the cleaning function.
- ► Never clean accessories at the same time.

▲ WARNING – Risk of harm to health!

The cleaning function heats up the cooking compartment to a very high temperature so that food left over from roasting, grilling and baking will burn off. This process releases vapours, which can irritate mucous membranes.

- Keep the kitchen well ventilated while the cleaning function is running.
- Do not remain in the room for long periods.
- Keep children and pets away.

▲ WARNING – Risk of burns!

The cooking compartment gets very hot when the cleaning function is in progress.

- Never open the appliance door.
- Allow the appliance to cool down.
- ► Keep children at a safe distance.

2 Preventing material damage

2.1 General

ATTENTION!

Objects on the cooking compartment floor at over 50 °C will cause heat to build up. The baking and roasting times will no longer be correct and the enamel will be damaged.

- Do not place any accessories, greaseproof paper or foil of any kind on the cooking compartment floor.
- Only place cookware on the cooking compartment floor if a temperature above 50 °C has been set.

When the cooking compartment is hot, any water inside it will create steam. The change in temperature may cause damage.

- Never pour water into the cooking compartment when it is still hot.
- Never place cookware containing water on the cooking compartment floor.

The prolonged presence of moisture in the cooking compartment leads to corrosion.

- Allow the cooking compartment to dry after use.
- Do not keep moist food in the cooking compartment for a long time with the door closed.
- Do not store food in the cooking compartment.

Leaving the appliance to cool down with the door open will damage the front of neighbouring kitchen units over time.

- Always allow the cooking compartment to cool down with the door closed after cooking at high temperatures.
- Take care not to trap anything in the appliance door.
- Only leave the cooking compartment to dry with the door open if a lot of moisture was produced during operation.

 \triangle The outside of the appliance gets very hot when the cleaning function is in progress.

- Never touch the appliance door.
- Allow the appliance to cool down.
- ► Keep children at a safe distance.

Fruit juice dripping from the baking tray leaves stains that cannot be removed.

- When baking very juicy fruit flans, do not pack too much on the baking tray.
- ► If possible, use the deeper universal pan.

Using oven cleaner in a hot cooking compartment damages the enamel.

- Never use oven cleaner in the cooking compartment when it is still warm.
- Remove all food remnants from the cooking compartment and the appliance door before you next heat up the appliance.

If the seal is very dirty, the appliance door will no longer close properly during operation. This may damage the front of adjacent kitchen units.

- Keep the seal clean at all times.
- Never operate the appliance if the seal is damaged or missing.

Sitting or placing objects on the appliance door may damage it.

- Do not place or hang objects on the appliance door.
- Do not place cookware or accessories on the appli-

ance door. With certain models, accessories may scratch the door pane when closing the appliance door.

 Always push accessories fully into the cooking compartment.

3 Environmental protection and saving energy

3.1 Disposing of packaging

The packaging materials are environmentally compatible and can be recycled.

 Sort the individual components by type and dispose of them separately.

3.2 Saving energy

If you follow these instructions, your appliance will use less power.

Only preheat the appliance if the recipe or the recommended settings tell you to do so.

Not preheating the appliance can reduce the energy used by up to 20%.

Use dark-coloured, black-coated or enamelled baking tins.

• These types of baking tin absorb the heat particularly well.

Open the appliance door as little as possible during operation.

 This will maintain the temperature in the cooking compartment and eliminate the need for the appliance to reheat.

When baking multiple dishes, do so in succession or in parallel.

 The cooking compartment is heated after baking the first dish. This reduces the baking time for the second cake.

If the cooking time is relatively long, you can switch the appliance off 10 minutes before the cooking time ends.

• There will be enough residual heat to finish cooking the dish.

Remove any accessories that are not being used from the cooking compartment.

 Accessories that are not being used do not need to be heated.

Allow frozen food to defrost before cooking.

 This will save the energy that would otherwise be required to defrost it.

The buttons are touch-sensitive surfaces. To se-



4 Familiarising yourself with your appliance

4.1 Controls

You can use the control panel to configure all functions of your appliance and to obtain information about the operating status.

Note: On certain models, specific details such as colour and shape may differ from those pictured.



4.2 Buttons and display

You can use the buttons to set various functions for your appliance. The display shows the settings.

If a function is active, the corresponding symbol lights up in the display. The clock symbol \bigcirc only lights up when you change the time.

4.3 Types of heating and functions

To ensure that you always use the right type of heating to cook your food, we have explained the differences and applications below.

When you select a type of heating, the appliance suggests a suitable temperature or setting. You can use these values or change them within the specified range.

Symbol	Type of heating and temperature range	What it's used for/how it works
8	3D hot air 30 - 275 °C	Bake and roast on one or more levels. The fan distributes the heat from the ring-shaped heating element in the back wall evenly around the cooking compartment.
	Gentle hot air 125 - 275 °C	Cook selected dishes gently on one level without preheating. The fan distributes the heat from the ring-shaped heating element in the back wall evenly around the cooking compartment. The food is cooked in phases us- ing residual heat. Always keep the appliance door closed when cooking. This type of heating is used to determine the energy consumption in air recircu- lation mode and the energy efficiency class.
C	Pizza setting 30 - 275 °C	Cook pizza or dishes that require a lot of heat from below. The bottom heating element and the ring-shaped heating element in the back wall heat the cooking compartment.
S	Keeping food warm 60 - 100 °C	Keep cooked food warm.
(∆**)	Defrosting 30 - 60 °C	Gently defrost frozen food.
	Slow cooking 70 - 120 °C	Slowly and gently cook seared, tender pieces of meat in uncovered cookware. The heat is emitted evenly from above and below at a low temperature.
	Full-surface grill Grill settings: 1 = low 2 = medium 3 = high	Grill flat items such as steak and sausages, or make toast. Gratinate food. The entire area underneath the grill element becomes hot.
	Hot air grilling 30 - 275 °C	Roast poultry, whole fish and larger pieces of meat. The grill element and the fan switch on and off alternately. The fan circulates the hot air around the food.
	Top/bottom heating 30 - 275 °C	Traditionally bake or roast on one level. This type of heating is ideal for cakes with moist toppings. The heat is emitted evenly from above and below. This type of heating is used to measure the energy consumption in the conven- tional mode.

Note: If you operate your appliance with the Home Connect app, even more functions are available for you. You can find more information about this in the app.

4.4 Temperature and setting levels

There are different settings for the types of heating and functions.

The settings appear in the display.

The temperature can be set in 1 degree increments up to 100 °C, and in 5 degree increments thereafter.

Note: For grill setting 3, the appliance lowers the setting to grill setting 1 after approx. 20 minutes.

Heat-up indicator

The appliance indicates when it is heating up. The line at the bottom of the display turns red from left to right as the cooking compartment heats up. When you are preheating the appliance, the optimal time to place your food in the cooking compartment is as soon as the entire line has turned red.

Residual heat indicator

If you switch off the appliance, the line on the display shows the residual heat in the cooking compartment. The lower the temperature in the cooking compartment, the less the line is filled.

Notes

- The heat-up indicator will only show the temperature increasing for types of heating for which a temperature is set. For grill settings, for example, the heat-up indicator shows a full line from the beginning.
- If the temperature in the cooking compartment is too high when the appliance is started, *h* appears in the display for some types of heating. Switch off the appliance and allow it to cool down. Then restart operation of the appliance.
- Due to thermal inertia, the temperature displayed may differ slightly from the actual temperature inside the cooking compartment.

4.5 Cooking compartment

The functions in the cooking compartment make your appliance easier to use.


Shelf supports

The shelf supports in the cooking compartment enable you to place accessories at different heights.

→ "Accessories", Page 9

Your appliance has five shelf positions. The shelf positions are numbered from bottom to top.

Depending on the appliance, the shelf supports are fitted with pull-out rails or clip-on pull-out rails. The pullout rails are fixed in place and cannot be removed. The clip-on pull-out rails allow you to use them as you wish at all free shelf positions. You can remove the shelf supports, e. g. for cleaning. \rightarrow "Shelf supports", Page 24



Lighting

The oven light lights up the cooking compartment. With most types of heating and functions, the lighting lights up during operation. The lighting goes off when operation ends.

You can switch on the lighting without heating the oven using the **Oven light** button.

Cooling fan

The cooling fan switches on and off depending on the appliance's temperature. The hot air escapes above the door.

ATTENTION!

Do not cover the ventilation slot above the appliance door. The appliance overheats.

• Ensure that the ventilation slots are unobstructed.

To ensure that the appliance cools down more quickly after operation, the cooling fan continues to run for a certain period afterwards.

Appliance door

If you open the appliance door during operation, the appliance stops heating. When you close the appliance door, the appliance continues to heat again.

5 Accessories

Use original accessories. These have been made especially for your appliance.

Note: Accessories may become deformed if they get hot. Deformation has no effect on function. As the accessory cools down, it will regain its original shape.

The accessories supplied may differ depending on the appliance model.

Accessories	Use
Wire rack	 Cake tins Ovenproof dishes Cookware Meat, e.g. roasting joints or steak Frozen meals
Universal pan	 Moist cakes Baked items Bread Large roasts Frozen meals Catching dripping liquids, e.g. fat when grilling food on the wire rack.
Meat thermometer	High-precision roasting or cooking. → "Meat thermometer", Page 14

5.1 Locking function

The locking function prevents the accessories from tilting when they are pulled out.


You can pull out the accessories approximately halfway without them tipping. The accessories must be inserted into the cooking compartment correctly for the tilt protection to work properly.

5.2 Sliding accessories into the cooking compartment


Always slide accessories into the cooking compartment correctly. This is the only way to ensure that accessories can be pulled out approximately halfway without tipping.

- 1. Turn the accessories so that the notch a is at the rear and is facing downwards.
- **2.** Insert accessories between the two guide rods for the shelf position.

Wire rack Insert the wire rack with the open side facing the appliance door and the curved lip \sim facing downwards.




Baking tray E.g. universal pan or baking tray Slide the tray, e.g. the universal pan, in with the sloping edge b facing the appliance door.



3. Place the accessory at the shelf positions with the pull-out rails and pull out the pull-out rails.

Wire rack or baking tray	Position the accessory so that its edge is behind the lug a on the pullout rail.

Note: The pull-out rails lock in place when they are fully pulled out. Gently push the pull-out rails back into the cooking compartment.


4. Push the accessory all the way in, making sure that it does not touch the appliance door.

Note: Take any accessories that you will not be using out of the cooking compartment while the appliance is in operation.

Combining accessories

You can combine the wire rack with the universal pan to catch any liquid that drips down.

- 1. Place the wire rack on the universal pan so that both spacers a are on the rear edge of the universal pan.
- 2. Insert the universal pan between the two guide rods for a shelf position. In so doing, the wire rack is on top of the upper guide rod.

Configure the settings for initial start-up. Clean the appliance and accessories.

6.1 Initial use

You need to make settings for initial use before you can use your appliance.

Setting the time on the clock

Once the appliance has been connected to the mains or following a power failure, the time flashes on the display. The time starts at "12:00". Set the current time. Requirement: The function selector must be set to the

"Off" position o.

- **1.** Use the or + button to set the time.
- 2. Press the 🕒 button.
- The time that is set appears on the display.

Tip: You can go to the basic settings \rightarrow Page 18 to specify whether or not the time should be shown on the display.

Accessories vary from one appliance to another. When purchasing accessories, always quote the exact product number (E no.) of your appliance. You can find out which accessories are available for your appliance in our online shop or from our aftersales service.

6.2 Cleaning the appliance before using it for the first time

Clean the cooking compartment and accessories before using the appliance to prepare food for the first time

- 1. Remove any accessories and leftover packaging, such as polystyrene pellets, from the cooking compartment.
- 2. Before heating the appliance, wipe the smooth surfaces in the cooking compartment with a soft, damp cloth.
- **3.** Keep the room ventilated while the appliance is heating.
- 4. Set the type of heating and temperature. → "Basic operation", Page 11

- 5. Switch off the appliance after the specified cooking time.
- 6. Wait until the cooking compartment has cooled down.
- 7. Clean the smooth surfaces with soapy water and a dish cloth.
- 8. Clean the accessories using soapy water and a dish cloth or soft brush.

7.3 Setting the type of heating and temperature

- The appliance starts heating after a few seconds.

Changing the type of heating

You can change the type of heating at any time.

Use the function selector to set the required type of heating.

Changing the temperature

You can change the temperature at any time.

Use the temperature selector to set the required temperature.

8 Rapid heating

To save time, rapid heating can shorten the preheating time for set temperatures over 100 °C. Rapid heating is possible for the following types of

heating:

8.1 Setting rapid heating

To ensure an even cooking result, do not place the food in the cooking compartment until rapid heating has come to an end.

Note: Do not set a cooking time until rapid heating has come to an end.

9 Time-setting options

Your appliance has different time-setting options, with which you can control its operation.

9.1 Overview of the time-setting options

With the $\ensuremath{\textcircled{}^{\text{O}}}$ button, select the different time-setting options.

Time-setting option	Use
Timer 🛛	The timer can be set independently of the appliance when it is in opera- tion. It does not affect the appliance.
Cooking time	If you set a cooking time, operation of the appliance stops automatically once this time has elapsed.
End time 🕒	For the cooking time, you can set the time at which operation ends. The appliance starts up automatically so that it finishes cooking at the re- quired time.
Time 🕒	You can set the time.

9.2 Setting the timer

The timer runs independently of the appliance when it is in operation. The timer can be set when the appliance is switched on or off, up to 23 hours and 59 minutes. The timer has its own audible signal so that you can tell whether it is the timer or a cooking time which has elapsed.

- 1. Press the ⁽) button repeatedly until [™] is highlighted in the display.
- **2.** Use the or + button to set the timer duration.

- Set a suitable type of heating and a temperature of at least 100 °C. Rapid heating automatically switches off at temper-
- atures of 200 °C and above.
 If rapid heating does not switch off automatically, press the ^{SS} button.
- \checkmark $\stackrel{\scriptstyle (i)}{}$ appears in the display.
- Rapid heating starts after a few seconds.
- Once rapid heating has ended, a signal tone sounds and the ^{SS} symbol goes out on the display.
- 3. Place the food in the cooking compartment.

Cancelling rapid heating

- Press the S button.
- ✓ The [∭] symbol disappears from the display.

The timer duration can be set in 30-second increments up to 10 minutes. Above 10 minutes, the time increments become longer the higher the value.

- The timer starts and the timer duration begins to count down after a few seconds.
- An audible signal sounds and the timer duration is zero in the display when the timer duration has elapsed.
- 3. Once the timer duration has elapsed:
 - Press any button to switch off the timer.

Changing the timer

You can change the timer duration at any time. **Requirement:** \boxtimes is highlighted on the display.

- Use the or + button to change the timer duration.
- The appliance applies the change after a few seconds.

Cancelling the timer

You can cancel the timer duration at any time.

Requirement: S is highlighted on the display.

- ► Use the button to reset the timer duration to zero.

9.3 Setting the cooking time

You can set a cooking time for operation of up to 23 hours 59 minutes.

Requirement: The type of heating and temperature or setting are set.

- 1. Press the ⁽⁾ button repeatedly until ⁽⁾ is highlighted in the display.
- **2.** Use the or + button to set the cooking time.

The cooking time can be set in 1-minute increments up to 1 hour, and then in 5-minute increments.

- The appliance starts heating and the cooking time counts down after a few seconds.
- If the cooking time has elapsed, an audible signal sounds and the display shows the cooking time as zero.
- 3. When the cooking time has elapsed:
 - Press any button to end the audible signal before it sounds.
 - To set a cooking time again, press the + button.
 - When your food is ready, switch off the appliance

Changing the cooking time

You can change the cooking time at any time. **Requirement:** (5) is highlighted on the display.

- ► Change the cooking time using the or + button.
- The appliance applies the change after a few seconds.

Cancelling the cooking time

You can cancel the cooking time at any time. **Requirement:** (5) is highlighted on the display.

- Reset the cooking time to zero using the button.
- After a few seconds, the appliance applies the change and continues to heat without a cooking time.

9.4 Setting the end time

You can delay the time at which cooking is due to finish by up to 23 hours and 59 minutes.

Notes

- In order to achieve a good cooking result, do not delay the end time once the appliance is already in operation.
- Food will spoil if you leave it in the oven cavity too long.

Requirements

- The type of heating and temperature or setting are set.
- A cooking time is set.
- 1. Press the ⁽⁾ button repeatedly until ⁽⁾ is highlighted in the display.
- **2.** Press the or + button.
- The display shows the calculated end time.
- **3.** Use the or + button to delay the end time.
- After a few seconds, the appliance applies the setting and the display shows the set end time.

- Once the calculated start time has been reached, the appliance starts heating up and the cooking time starts counting down.
- Once the time has elapsed, an audible signal sounds and the display shows the cooking time as zero.
- 4. When the cooking time has elapsed:
 - Press any button to end the signal prematurely.
 - To set another cooking time, press the + button.
 - When your food is ready, switch off the appliance.

Changing the end time

In order to achieve a good cooking result, you can only change the set end time before operation starts and the cooking time starts counting down.

Requirement: (b) is highlighted on the display.

- ► Use the or + button to delay the end time.
- The appliance applies the change after a few seconds.

Cancelling the end time

You can delete the set end at any time.

Requirement: (b) is highlighted on the display.

- Reset the end time to the current time plus the set cooking time using the — button.
- After a few seconds, the appliance applies the change and starts heating up. The cooking time counts down.

9.5 Setting the time on the clock

Once the appliance has been connected to the mains or following a power failure, the time flashes on the display. The time starts at "12:00". Set the current time. **Requirement:** The function selector must be set to the "Off" position \circ .

- 1. Use the or + button to set the time.
- **2.** Press the \bigcirc button.
- ✓ The time that is set appears on the display.

Tip: You can go to the basic settings \rightarrow *Page 18* to specify whether or not the time should be shown on the display.

Changing the time on the clock

You can change the time on the clock at any time. **Requirement:** The function selector must be set to the "Off" position \circ .

- 1. Press the ^(C) button repeatedly until ^(C) is highlighted in the display.
- **2.** Use the or + button to change the time.
- The appliance applies the change after a few seconds.

10 Meat thermometer

Cook with precision by inserting the meat probe into the food and setting a core temperature on the appliance. Once the set core temperature has been reached in the food, the appliance stops automatically.

10.1 Suitable types of heating with the meat thermometer

Only certain types of heating are suitable for use with the meat thermometer.

Suitable heating functions include:

- 3D hot air
- Gentle hot air
- Pizza setting C
- Hot air grilling II
- Top/bottom heating

Note: If the meat thermometer is being used and you select an unsuitable type of heating, a signal sounds.

10.2 Inserting the meat thermometer

Use the meat thermometer supplied or order a suitable meat thermometer from our after-sales service.

MARNING – Risk of electric shock!

Using the wrong meat probe could damage the insulation.

Only use the meat probe for this specific appliance.

ATTENTION!

Otherwise the meat probe may be damaged.

- Do not trap the cable of the meat probe.
- To prevent the meat probe from being damaged by excessive heat, there must be a gap of a few centimetres between the grill element and the meat probe. The meat may expand during the cooking process.
- Insert the meat thermometer at an angle into the thickest part of the meat. Ensure that the tip of the meat thermometer is correctly positioned in the meat:
 - The tip must be roughly in the middle of the food.
 - The tip must not be inserted in the fat.
 - The tip must not touch any cookware or bones.
- 2. Place the food with the meat thermometer into the cooking compartment.

It is best to place the food in cookware into the centre of the wire rack.

3. Plug the meat thermometer into the socket on the left-hand side of the cooking compartment.

Notes

- If you remove the meat thermometer while the food is cooking, all the settings will be reset.
- Do not remove the meat thermometer when turning the food. Once you have turned the food, check that the meat thermometer is correctly positioned in the food.

10.3 Setting the meat thermometer

The meat probe measures the temperature inside the food between 30 $^\circ\text{C}$ and 99 $^\circ\text{C}.$

Requirements

- The food with the meat probe is in the cooking compartment.
- The meat probe is plugged in inside the cooking compartment.
- **1.** Use the function selector to set a suitable type of heating.
- ✓ S lights up in the display and the core temperature display appears next to the temperature of the cooking compartment.
- 2. Use the or + button to set the core temperature.
- Use the temperature selector to set the temperature of the cooking compartment. Set the cooking compartment temperature at least 10 °C higher than the core temperature. Do not set the cooking compartment temperature to higher than 250 °C.
- ✓ The appliance starts heating after a few seconds.
- The current core temperature of the food is shown on the left, while the set core temperature is shown on the right, e.g. 15 °C|75 °C. The current core temperature only appears once it reaches 10 °C.
- Once the food reaches the core temperature, an audible signal sounds and, in the display, the current core temperature is equal to the set core temperature, e.g. 75 °C|75 °C.

4. 🖄 WARNING – Risk of burns!

The cooking compartment, accessories and meat probe become very hot.

 Always use oven gloves to remove hot accessories and the meat probe from the cooking compartment.

When the core temperature is reached:

- Switch off the appliance.
- Pull the meat probe out of the socket in the cooking compartment.
- Pull the meat probe out of the food remove it from the cooking compartment.

11 Programme

The programmes help you to use your appliance to prepare different dishes by selecting the optimum settings automatically.

11.1 Cookware for programmes

You should therefore use heat-resistant cookware that is suitable for temperatures up to 300 °C. Glass or glass ceramic cookware is best. The joint should cover approx. two thirds of the cookware base.

11.2 Programme table

The programme numbers are assigned to specific foods.

Cookware made from the following material is not suitable:

- Bright, shiny aluminium
- Unglazed clay
- Plastic or plastic handles

11.3 Preparing food for the programme

Use fresh and, ideally, chilled food. Use frozen food straight from the freezer.

- 1. Weigh the food. The weight of the food is required in order to correctly set the programme.
- 2. Add the food to the cookware.
- **3.** Place the cookware onto the wire rack. Always place the cookware into the cooking compartment while it is cold.

11.4 Setting a programme

The appliance selects the optimal type of heating, temperature and cooking time. All you need to do is set the weight.

Notes

- You can set the weight only in the intended area.
- After the programme starts, you can no longer change the programme and the weight.
- 1. Use the function selector to set $\mathbf{Programme}$ \mathbb{II} .
- 2. Use the or + button to set the required programme.
- **3.** Use the temperature selector to set the weight of your food. Always set the next higher weight.
 - To call up the programme's cooking time, press the ⁽⁾ button. The cooking time cannot be changed.

- For some programmes, the ^(C) button can be used to delay the end.
 - \rightarrow "Setting the end time", Page 13
- After a few seconds, the programme starts and the cooking time counts down.
- If the programme has ended, an audible signal sounds and the display shows the cooking time as zero.

12 Childproof lock

You can secure your appliance to prevent children from accidentally switching it on or changing the settings.

Note: You can go to the basic settings \rightarrow *Page 18* to specify whether you want the option to set the child-proof lock.

13 Sabbath mode

You can set a time of over 70 hours using Sabbath mode. You can use **Top/bottom heating** to keep food warm between 85 °C and 140 °C during this time without having to switch the appliance on or off.

13.1 Starting Sabbath mode

Notes

- If you open the appliance door during operation, the appliance stops heating. When you close the appliance door, the appliance continues to heat again.
- Once it has started, you can no longer change or interrupt Sabbath mode.
- You cannot delay the end time for Sabbath mode.

Requirement: Sabbath mode is activated in the basic settings.

→ "Basic settings", Page 18

- 4. When the programme ends:
 - Press any button to end the audible signal prematurely.
 - To set a cooking time for further cooking, press the + button. The appliance continues to heat using the programme settings.
 - When your food is ready, switch off the appliance.

12.1 Activating and deactivating the childproof lock

Requirement: The function selector must be set to the "Off" position **Q**.

- - To deactivate the childproof lock, press and hold the ∽ button until ∽ goes out in the display.
- 1. Use the function selector to set the programmes $\overline{\mathbb{M}}$.
- ✓ 5865 appears in the display.
- 2. Use the temperature selector to set the temperature.
- **3.** Press the ^(C) button repeatedly until ^(C) is highlighted on the display.
- **4.** Use the or + button to set the time.
- After a few seconds, the appliance starts heating and the cooking time counts down.
- 5. Once the time has elapsed, the display shows the time as zero. The appliance stops heating up and responds again as usual outside of Sabbath mode.
 Switch off the appliance.

The appliance automatically switches off after approx. 10 to 20 minutes.

14.2 Changing basic settings

Requirement: The appliance is switched off.

- 1. Press and hold the ^(C) button for approximately four seconds.
- ✓ The first basic setting appears in the display, e.g. *c□ i i i*.
- 2. Use the temperature selector to change the setting.
- **3.** Use the or + button to switch to the next basic setting.
- **4.** To save the changes, press and hold the ⁽⁾ button for approx. four seconds.

Note: Your changes to the basic settings will be retained even after a power failure.

14.3 Discarding changes to the basic settings

- Turn the function selector.
- All changes are discarded and not saved.

15 Home Connect

This appliance is network-capable. Connecting your appliance to a mobile device lets you control its functions via the Home Connect app, adjust its basic settings and monitor its operating status.

The Home Connect services are not available in every country. The availability of the Home Connect function depends on the availability of Home Connect services in your country. You can find information about this at: www.home-connect.com.

15.3 Operating the appliance with the Home Connect app

You can use the Home Connect app to set and start the appliance remotely.

A WARNING – Risk of fire!

Combustible objects that are left in the cooking compartment may catch fire.

- Never store combustible objects in the cooking compartment.
- If smoke is emitted, the appliance must be switched off or the plug must be pulled out and the door must be held closed in order to stifle any flames.

Requirements

- The appliance is switched on.
- The appliance is connected to your home network and to the Home Connect app.
- In order to be able to set the appliance via the app, the manual or permanent remote start must be selected in the HL IH basic setting.
- 1. To activate the remote start, set the function selector to □.
- **2.** Implement a setting in the app and send it to the appliance.

15.4 Software update

Your appliance's software can be updated using the software update function, e.g. for the purposes of optimisation, troubleshooting or security updates. To do this, you must be a registered Home Connect user, have installed the app on your mobile device and be connected to the Home Connect server. As soon as a software update is available, you will be informed via the Home Connect app and will be able to start the software update via the app. Once the update has been successfully downloaded, you can start installing it via the Home Connect app if you are in your WLAN home network (Wi-Fi). The Home Connect app will inform you once installation is successful.

Notes

- You can continue to use your appliance as normal while updates are downloading. Depending on your personal settings in the app, software updates can also be set to download automatically.

15.5 Remote diagnostics

15.6 Data protection

- Security certificate of the Wi-Fi communication module (to ensure a secure data connection).
- The current software and hardware version of your appliance.
- Status of any previous reset to factory settings.

This initial registration prepares the Home Connect functions for use and is only required when you want to use the Home Connect functions for the first time.

16 Cleaning and servicing

To keep your appliance working efficiently for a long time, it is important to clean and maintain it carefully.

16.1 Cleaning products

In order to avoid damaging the various oven surfaces on the appliance, do not use unsuitable cleaning products.

MARNING – Risk of electric shock!

An ingress of moisture can cause an electric shock.

 Do not use steam- or high-pressure cleaners to clean the appliance.

ATTENTION!

Unsuitable cleaning products may damage the surfaces of the appliance.

- Do not use harsh or abrasive cleaning products.
- Do not use cleaning products with a high alcohol content.
- Do not use hard scouring pads or cleaning sponges.
- Do not use any special cleaners for cleaning the appliance while it is hot.

Using oven cleaner in a hot cooking compartment damages the enamel.

- Never use oven cleaner in the cooking compartment when it is still warm.
- Remove all food remnants from the cooking compartment and the appliance door before you next heat up the appliance.

New sponge cloths contain residues from production.

Wash new sponge cloths thoroughly before use.

17 Pyrolytic self-cleaning

The **Pyrolytic self-cleaning** cleaning function cleans the cooking compartment almost by itself. Use the cleaning function to clean the cooking compartment every two to three months. If required, you can use the cleaning function more frequently. The cleaning function requires approx. 2.5–4.8 kilowatt hours.

17.1 Preparing the appliance for the cleaning function

In order to achieve a good cleaning result, prepare the appliance carefully.

A WARNING – Risk of fire!

Combustible objects that are left in the cooking compartment may catch fire.

- Never store combustible objects in the cooking compartment.
- If smoke is emitted, the appliance must be switched off or the plug must be pulled out and the door must be held closed in order to stifle any flames.

Loose food remnants, fat and meat juices may catch fire when the cleaning function is in progress.

Before you start the cleaning function, always remove coarse dirt from the cooking compartment.
 Never clean accessories at the same time.

The outside of the appliance gets very hot when the cleaning function is in progress.

- Never hang combustible objects, e.g. tea towels, on the door handle.
- Leave the front of the appliance clear.
- Keep children at a safe distance.

If the door seal is damaged, a large amount of heat is generated around the door.

- Do not scrub or remove the seal.
- Never operate the appliance if the seal is damaged or missing.

- 1. Remove accessories and cookware from the cooking compartment.
- Unhook the shelf supports and remove them from the cooking compartment.

- **3.** Remove heavy soiling from the cooking compartment.
- Use a detergent solution and a soft cloth to clean the surfaces at the edges of the cooking compartment around the door seal. Do not remove or scrub the door seal. Use oven cleaner to remove stubborn dirt from the inner door pane.
- 5. Remove any objects from the cooking compartment. The cooking compartment must be empty.

17.2 Setting the cleaning function

Ventilate the kitchen while the cleaning function is running.

MARNING – Risk of harm to health!

The cleaning function heats up the cooking compartment to a very high temperature so that food left over from roasting, grilling and baking will burn off. This process releases vapours, which can irritate mucous membranes.

- Keep the kitchen well ventilated while the cleaning function is running.
- Do not remain in the room for long periods.
- Keep children and pets away.





24 How it works

Here, you can find the ideal settings for various types of food as well as the best accessories and cookware. We have perfectly tailored these recommendations to your appliance.

24.1 Cooking tips

Observe this information when preparing food.

- The temperature and cooking time depend on the amount of food and the recipe. Settings ranges are specified for this reason. Try using the lower values to start with.
- The setting values apply to food placed in the cooking compartment while the cooking compartment is still cold. Do not slide the accessory into the cooking compartment until it has finished preheating.
- Remove any accessories that are not being used from the cooking compartment.

Position baking tins/dishes either next to one another or offset on different shelves so that they are not directly one above the other in the cooking compartment. For best results, we recommend using dark-coloured metal bakeware.

24.3 Notes on roasting and grilling

The setting values are based on the assumption that unstuffed, chilled, ready-to-roast poultry, meat or fish is placed into a cold cooking compartment.

- The larger the poultry, meat or fish, the lower the cooking temperature and the longer the cooking time.
- Turn the poultry, meat or fish after approx. 1/2 to 2/3 of the time listed.
- Add a little liquid to the poultry in the cookware. Cover the bottom of the cookware with approx. 1– 2 cm of liquid.
- When you turn poultry, ensure that the breast side or skin side is underneath to begin with.
- Cooking time calculation (e.g. 20 + 35): To calculate the cooking time, assume 20 minutes per 500 g of meat plus an extra 35 minutes. For 1.5 kg, the cooking time is then 95 minutes.
- Cooking time range (e.g. 10–15): Your food will be ready within the specified range of time.

Roasting and grilling on the wire rack

Roasting on the wire rack works particularly well for large poultry or for multiple pieces at the same time.

 Depending on the size and type of the food to be roasted, add up to 1/2 litre water to the universal pan.

You can make a sauce from the juices that are caught. This also means that less smoke is produced and the cooking compartment becomes less dirty.

- Keep the appliance door closed when using the grill.
- Never grill with the appliance door open.
- Place the food to be grilled on the wire rack. In addition, slide the universal pan in at least one shelf position lower, with the slanted edge facing the appliance door. This means that any dripping fat is caught.

Roasting in cookware

When preparing food in cookware with a lid, the cooking compartment remains cleaner.

Follow the manufacturer's instructions for your roasting dishes. Glass cookware is best.

Cookware without lid

Use a deep roasting dish.

- Place the cookware onto the wire rack.
- If you do not have any suitable cookware, use the universal pan.

Cookware with lid

- Place the cookware onto the wire rack.
- Meat, poultry and fish can also become crispy in a covered roasting dish. Use a roasting dish with a glass lid. Set a higher temperature.

MARNING – Risk of injury!

If hot glass cookware is placed on a wet or cold surface, the glass may shatter.

 Place hot glass ovenware on a dry mat after cooking.

▲ WARNING – Risk of scalding!

Very hot steam may escape when the lid is opened after cooking. Steam may not be visible, depending on the temperature.

24.5 Yoghurt

- **3.** Cover the containers with foil, e. g. with cling film.
- 4. Place the containers on the cooking compartment floor.
- **5.** Set the appliance according to the recommended setting.
- 6. After making the yoghurt, leave it to cool in the refrigerator.

24.6 Slow cooking

Slow cooking is a technique for cooking food over a long period at low temperatures. For this reason, it is also called "low-temperature cooking".

Slow cooking food

Requirements

- Only use fresh, clean and hygienic meat without bones.
- Only start operation when the cooking compartment has fully cooled down.

- 1. Preheat the cooking compartment and cookware for approx. 15 minutes.
- 2. Sear the meat on all sides on the cooking zone at a very high heat.
- **3.** Immediately place the meat into the pre-warmed cookware in the cooking compartment.
- **4.** Keep the appliance door closed in order to maintain an even cooking climate.



Observe this information when installing the appliance.




25.1 General installation instructions

Follow these instructions before you start with the installation of the appliance.

- The safe operation of this appliance can only be guaranteed if it has been installed to a professional standard in accordance with these installation instructions. The installer shall be liable for damages incurred as a result of incorrect installation.
- Check the appliance for damage after unpacking it. Do not connect the appliance if it has been damaged in transit.
- Before starting up the appliance, remove any packaging material and adhesive film from the cooking compartment and the door.
- Proceed in accordance with the installation sheets for installing accessories.

- Fitted units must be heat-resistant up to 95 °C, and adjacent unit fronts up to 70 °C.
- Do not install the appliance behind a decorative door or the door of a kitchen unit. There is a risk of overheating.
- Cut-out work on the units should be carried out before installing the appliance. Remove any shavings. Otherwise, the correct operation of electrical components may be adversely affected.
- The mains socket for the appliance must either be located in the hatched area a or outside of the area where the appliance is installed.

Any unsecured units must be secured to the wall using a standard bracket **b**.



- Wear protective gloves so that you do not cut yourself. Parts that are accessible during installation may have sharp edges.
- Dimensions of the figures in mm.

▲ WARNING – Risk of fire!

It is dangerous to use an extended power cord and non-approved adapters.

- Do not use multiple socket strips.
- Only use extension cables that are certified, have a minimum cross section of 1.5 mm² and comply with the applicable national safety requirements.
- If the power cord is too short, contact customer service.
- Only use adapters approved by the manufacturer.





25.3 Installation below a worktop


Observe the installation dimensions and the installation instructions when installing below a worktop.



- To ventilate the appliance, the intermediate floor must have a ventilation cut-out.
- In combination with induction hobs, the gap between the worktop and appliance must not be sealed using additional strips.
- The worktop must be secured to the built-in unit.
- Observe any available installation instructions for the hob.

25.4 Installation in a tall unit


Observe the installation dimensions and the installation instructions when installing in a tall unit.



- To ventilate the appliance, the intermediate floors must have a ventilation cut-out.
- If the tall unit has another back panel in addition to the element back panels, this must be removed.
- Only fit the appliance up to a height which allows accessories to be easily removed.

25.5 Corner installation

Observe the installation dimensions and the installation instructions when installing in a corner.



 To ensure that the appliance door can be opened, you must take the minimum dimensions into consideration when installing in a corner. The dimension a is dependent on the thickness of the unit front and the handle.

25.6 Electrical connection

In order to safely connect the appliance to the electrical system, follow these instructions.

- The appliance corresponds to protection class I and must only be operated with a protective earth connection.
- The fuse protection must correspond to the power rating specified on the appliance's rating plate and to local regulations.
- The appliance must be disconnected from the power supply whenever installation work is being carried out.
- The appliance must only be connected using the power cable provided.
- The power cable must be plugged in at the rear of the appliance until you hear a clicking sound. A 3 m power cable can be obtained from the after-sales service.
- The power cable must only be replaced with a cable from the original manufacturer. This is available from after-sales service.
- Contact protection must be ensured during the installation.

Electrically connect the appliance with the protective contact plug

Note: The appliance must only be connected to a protective contact socket that has been correctly installed.

Insert the plug into the protective contact socket. When the appliance is installed, the mains plug of the power cord must be freely accessible. If free access to the mains plug is impossible, an all-pole isolating switch must be integrated into the permanent electrical installation in accordance with the installation regulations.

Electrically connecting an appliance without a protective contact plug

Note: Only a licensed professional may connect the appliance. Damage caused by incorrect connection is not covered under the warranty.

An all-pole isolating switch must be integrated into the permanent electrical installation according to the installation regulations.


1. Identify the phase and neutral conductors in the socket.

The appliance may be damaged if it is not connected correctly.


- 2. Connect the hob in accordance with the connection diagram.
 - See the rating plate for the voltage.
- **3.** Connect the wires of the mains power cable according to the colour coding:
 - Green/yellow = Protective conductor
 - Blue = Neutral conductor
 - Brown = Phase (external conductor)

25.7 Installing the appliance


1. Slide the appliance in fully and centre it.



2. Screw the appliance into place.



- **3.** For handleless kitchens with vertical bar handle strips:
 - Attach a suitable filling piece ① in order to cover any sharp edges and to guarantee a safe installation.
 - Pre-drill aluminium profiles to establish a screw connection ⁽²⁾.
 - Secure the appliance using a suitable screw 3.



Note: The gap between the worktop and the appliance must not be closed by additional battens. Thermal insulation strips must not be fitted to the side panels of the surround unit.

25.8 Removing the appliance

- 1. Disconnect the appliance from the power supply.
- 2. Undo the fastening screws.
- 3. Lift the appliance slightly and pull it out completely.



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
